# 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

---

## 1.1 INTRODUCTION

Govt. Degree College Kishtwar was established in the year 1986, and since its establishment, the college was functioning in a makeshift arrangement in the premises of Boys Higher Secondary School with few classrooms offering only some B.A courses then it was shifted to Islamia Faridia College of Education after the introduction of Science classes. Thereafter, the own college campus (spreading over 91.12 kanals of land) was inaugurated by the then Chief Minister of the J&K sate, Dr. Farooq Abdullah and various additional programmes like B.Com and some other B.A. courses were also introduced. The college is permanently affiliated to University of Jammu, which designs the curricula and conducts examination and the institution is making full efforts for the smooth functioning of the both. Presently the college is offering as many as 20 courses ones to cater the needs of students from different background. Besides curriculum, the college is very much focusing on the development of students' overall personality by exposing them to different events and programmes such as debates, conferences, seminars, essay competition and other cultural programmes. Not only this, our college students have been time and again participating in various sports related activities within state. The college has separate Academic, Administrative, pre fabricated rooms and Science Blocks. A block with conference room and two ICT rooms, under construction multipurpose auditorium, vocational center and under construction SC Hostel The Academic Block has fourteen large fully furnished lecture theatres, a staff room, Girls Common Room, NSS Office, Sports office, and a Computer Lab consisting of 32 internet connected computers. The college has a very rich and sem- automated library with more than 19 thousand books and journals. The library has a Reading Hall and Browsing Centre. The college has also a hygienic canteen which offers many food items on affordable prices. The whole campus has Wi-Fi internet connection. The college also offers Bus facility to the far-off students.

Govt Degree College kishtwar envisions to become a premier resource centre and path finder in rendering access to higher education to women folk of the society. The institution aims to implant democratic values,

tolerance and service amongst its students which consequently prove good human resources for the moral health of the nation. Learner centric approach in teaching-learning is something which renders a better sense of expression and liberty amid the students which ultimately hardens them to face future challenges. Grasping the content and quality of freedom a student is enabled and empowered to fulfill her freedom to fullest of her potential. Subsequently, potential actualized to its zenith leads to the creation of a human resource par excellence. Having achieved it, an individual becomes morally upright and spiritually orientated who is of immense value for the society. In order to provide students with competence for employability and developing practical knowledge, Skill Enhancement Courses have been introduced by the affiliated university which prove of great value to students in leading their lives. However, we intend to introduce certain value added courses in near future for the students so as to equip them for self employment and we are in continuous process of taking it up by being party to various decision making bodies.

## **1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)**

### **Institutional Strength**

The institution has highest enrollment of students in the entire district which clearly signifies its reputation and acceptability among the Young learners .Both faculty and students are working with great dedication to accomplish the institution mission .Various facilities like computer lab, separate browsing centre, Conference hall, Smart classrooms, Industrial centre , separate science labs ,Community hall ,recently established geography lab are some of the infrastructural strengths of institution and focus is to improve their quality and quantity in the near future. The institution has separate Administrative block , Arts block and Science block. Department of Botany has established a separate Wooden craft room which again adds to the strength of institution. Separate botanical and Herbal garden with collection of local medicinal, endemic plants also adds to the value of institution. The institution has a big library with rich collection of Textbooks, Encyclopedias, Fiction, Biographies and hence easily catering the needs and demands of all the students and faculties. Dynamic NSS unit is again one of the strength which, in the last couple of years, has brought laurels for the institution. Separate Career Counseling and Guidance cell is again doing its best for guiding the students in the right direction towards their better future. The institution regularly host a number of competitions like painting, slogan, Essay , Debate on various issues of Social, Environmental ,Cultural and technological importance adding value to the quality of institution. The district is considered communally very sensitive but the institution has not witnessed even a single communal disturbance in the last 30 years and hence maintaining communal harmony among students and faculty is again one of the big strength of institution.

### **Institutional Weakness**

There is shortage of Teaching & Non-teaching staff in the institution which is a persistent and growing problem, given the fact that the number of student enrolment is increasing year by year. Moreover, the majority of the students are from socio-economic backward and far flung areas of district, which are largely responsible for poor language competence.

Further, due to tough terrain area, the college suffers due failure of electricity and poor internet connectivity.

### **Institutional Opportunity**

The majority of the students belong to the economically backward rural families. The college provides scholarships to the deserving students in order to encourage them for pursuing higher education and provide ample opportunities for the staff to participate in various faculty developing programmes. The college also takes initiatives for Improving the soft skills and employability among students.

Improving teacher quality by virtue of allowing them pursue research and attend seminars/conferences and publish books and research papers. Having very young faculty, there is lot of opportunity to develop research culture in the college. Having lot of unconstructed land, new academic and other blocks can be constructed to offer new programmes and courses for which proposals have been already submitted to Higher Education J&K Govt. The location of the college is the hub of lot of catchment area, which provides the opportunity to educate the increasing role of students in the college.

### **Institutional Challenge**

The institution has its own share of challenges to face and tackle. Student teacher ratio is high. Majority of students belong to educationally and economically backwards families which poses challenge to faculty to prepare them for the present competitive world. Improving communication skills among the students and also it is challenging to manage curricular activities within limited number of classrooms.

## **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

### **Curricular Aspects**

The college makes every effort to realize its mission of developing competent human resource through quality education, by creating innovative educational environment and promoting creativity to develop skilled human resource. To provide better chances for distributing available educational opportunities, the college has made efforts to different courses in tune with diversifying interests and career opportunities. The college is running market oriented courses like computer applications and B.COM ,

The college provides opportunities for better exposure to the students by conducting field trips, language labs through deputation to various reputed institutes like Jammu University. However it is pertinent to mention that the college is teaching the curricula designed by the affiliating university and the institute makes every effort for curriculum improvement through its representatives participating in boards of studies meetings who provide suggestions and inputs for revision of the syllabus in the respective departments of university of Jammu. The college has a committee to look after the effective implementation and timely completion of prescribed syllabi in different disciplines.

The college is looking to introduce courses which are as per the aspirations of the students and demands of the local community.

### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

For effective teaching learning process in the Institution , every possible measure is undertaken to benefit and reach out to all the categories irrespective of cast ,creed ,religion, sex or place of birth. Distance learning programs are also offered for all those learners who can't afford the regular courses because of certain unavoidable circumstances and family issues. In the recent times, steps have been taken to modernize the teaching learning process in the college by introducing new means of imparting knowledge and facilitating student learning process by way of smart classroom concept and all possible modern teaching Aids. In the recent times ,the institution has witnessed an increasing trend in the enrollment of students (regular and distance learning) which clearly depicts the hardwork and dedication of faculty for attracting young learners towards higher education. Focus is also to attract the youth belonging to disadvantaged categories towards higher education and certain measures are already undertaken in the form of various scholarship programs ,skill development courses etc .Attendance of students, their participation in various activities of the institution, Co-curricular programs and marks secured in class tests , various project works and Practical works are some of the important means by which learners are evaluated .To facilitate overall development of personality, students are encouraged to participate in the NSS and NCC activities of the institution. Recently the institutions has achieved various milestones in various NSS activities both at district level and state level. For making teaching learning process more effective,some steps like Seminars , Power point presentations, educational tours ,workshops, conferences and various TLMs(Teaching Learning Modules) are already undertaken and more innovative steps will be followed in the near future to make it more vibrant .

### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

Research is a very significant component for any Higher Education Institution. Higher Education may be judged by the quality of research it has conducted and its extension has been made up to the grass-root level of the society. Research, Innovations and extensions is the yardstick for any Higher Education Institution about its reputation or rank.GDC Kishtwar is an institution of higher learning actively involved in the research and its extension activities for the societal cause. Most of our faculty members are having Doctorate Degree and some faculty members are pursuing their Doctorate Degree from the reputed Universities of the country as a result the research culture in the institution is very good.

Most of the Faculty members have published number of articles in different Journals of national and international repute. Some faculty members have published books while other are involved in reviewing the books etc. Most of the faculty members are actively involved in organizing the seminars and conferences in their respective expertise field to carry out the research activities in thr college with the support of the college administration while some seminars and conferences have been organized in collaboration with the industries during which good number of students have shown their participation in witnessing the extension of research activities in the college.

In our institution there are numbers of cells and clubs like NCC ,NSS, Career and counselling cell ,Electoral Literacy Club, Red Ribben Club and Women Empowerment Cell etc which organized the different extension activities like Internship camps, Rallies, Painting competitions, seminars, conferences and Awareness camps etc to extend the research activities at the grass-root level of the society. All such programmes and activities somehow promotes the research culture of the college.

### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

Government degree college kishtwar has approximately 91 kanal of land and is protected through boundary

wall from all sides. During the past 20 years the number of students has increased manifold and has crossed more than 1200 in all the semesters. College started its classes in medical and non medical stream in 2001 in makeshift basis in islamia faridia college of education, and was shifted to GDC kishtwar after the completion of sciences laboratories in 2003. The institution has in total 19 lecture halls (6 smart classroom with latest gadgets) ,7 labs (4 with smart LEDs) with internet facilities, 1 sophisticated seminar hall, 1 browsing centre, IQAC, Girls Common Room, women grievance cell ,Career counseling cell, EDUSAT, NCC Male and NCC female wing ,all are accommodated in different rooms. Apart from this there is separate arrangement for the NSS volunteers. In order to cater the demands of IGNOU, MANUU, and distance education in connection with infrastructure are also accomplished by GDC kishtwar. Administrative block, arts block, science deptt. and labs, library, college auditorium, conference hall, play fields are monitored through CCTV. College has a rich library with all facilities including all weather ACs which inculcate the habits of reading of book among students. Library has more than 19000 books, with a reading hall. Well established principle residential quarter had been handed over by JKPC. One big auditorium is under construction and DPR of some planned work has been submitted to higher authorities for approval.

### **Student Support and Progression**

For the development of a child, institution provide all the facilities that impact overall learning process as well as the mental and physical growth the students. Our college takes pride in itself for its wonderful atmosphere. One of the important factor students take into account while choosing an institute is the opportunities that it offers to its students. In this regard the college is providing both indoor and outdoor sports facilities.

The institution is helping socially and economically backward students by providing assistance in the form of scholarships (Government and institutional). More than 58% of the students have benefitted by such scholarships in the last five years.

The college also conducts remedial classes for slow learners. The college runs DDE center of University of Jammu, IGNOU center and MANUU center for the students who are not able to take regular classes. The college provides other basic facilities like transportation services, canteen facility , library facility ,personal facility , well-equipped laboratories,

conference hall, Wi-Fi in the whole campus, First Aid facility, guidance for competitive examination etc. The college has established a student counseling cell which conducts counseling programs on regular basis in collaboration with various agencies like Reliance job info com, LIC of India, BSE etc.

For the female students the college has girls common room and different committees like woman grievance cell which guide and support girls students by conducting regular interactive sessions in the form of meetings and celebrating different events like international women day etc. In addition college have anti ragging committee. The institution Publishes it's up Dated Prospects which highlights the basic facilities in the college having information about different committees of the college, college annual calendar etc. The college publishes its annual magazine which provides a platform for the students, faculty members and civil society of kishtwar to share / write their creative writing.

The institution have NCC and NSS wings . The college has started the process for the formation of ALLUMNI association in the year 2021.

### **Governance, Leadership and Management**

The Principal is the head of the institution. He provides leadership and guidance in planning, organizing and execution of all the programmes with the active support and participation of the staff members. The institution has a well-defined decentralized organizational structure to co-ordinate the academic and administrative

functions. In matters related to students, discipline and college development, there are various committees in the college. Faculty of the college are the convenor & members of the various committees. In every matter the decisions are taken by the Principal in due consultation with the faculty members in an open and democratic environment. Student's executive body is one of the members in decision making for various events viz. tour/picnic, field trips and allied co-curricular activities. Students in different capacities also participate in maintaining discipline in the institution and provide their valuable. Feedback regarding teaching-learning process. Following committees are different wings of decentralized organisational structure of the institution:

The enrolment capacity of the college has increased exponentially for last half of the decade and is continuously showing upward trends. By virtue of this we are in need of infrastructure development both horizontally as well as vertically. Working on these lines college has strategized to raise different projects including additional classrooms (geography block), library block, girl's hostel, college canteen and one multipurpose hall. However till date we are able to materialize one of the projects i.e., science block constituting of eight classrooms with allied infrastructure. The construction of the building is almost at the verge of completion. Once this project gets through we will be able to accommodate reasonable number of students and manage in a better way accordingly. Besides, the renovation of multi-purpose auditorium hall of college is going on.

Effectiveness of various bodies/cells/committees is evident through minutes of meetings and Implementation of their resolutions. Various Welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff come under the preview of State government and college is run by Civil Services Rules.

### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

The college is very much concerned towards certain important issues like environmental and gender so that students can be sensitised as to make them responsible towards society. In order to provide quality education in various emerging disciplines the college adheres strictly to its vision being an institution of co-education and also with regards to safety and security of students. The college is also concerned against sexual harassment and anti-ragging processes and so has Women Empowerment Committee and also Committee against sexual harassment working here. The college administration is very much active in taking action against students involved in these activities provided any feedback comes from students.

The college is active in conducting and campaigning environment cleanliness and awareness. The committee of Campus beautification is involved in our college to meet this particular purpose. Moreover NSS committee of college plays an important role in the cleanliness drive and has adopted several villages to educate and sensitive local communities with a mission to make our society pollution free.

The Nss volunteers are also being trained to sensitive people about communal harmony.

In order to save electricity consumption the college is using ecofriendly electric gadgets such as LCD boards, LED bulbs, up-to date computers and overhead projectors.

Professors in Veterinary Science and Horticulture have already been sanctioned by HED.

College Library provides teachers and students with necessary learning resources for effective curriculum delivery and learning enrichment.

The college offers one compulsory undergraduate course on environment sciences. Though there is no general subject on gender and human values but within syllabus of many courses there is huge material available which addresses certain issues like gender, human values and professional ethics.

### 1.Environmental studies:

This is a compulsory course offered to first and 2nd semester UG students. It consists of 100 marks and includes the following topics in its curricula:

- 1.The Environment and Ecosystem
- 2.Bio-Diversity and its Conservation
- 3.Natural Resources and its Conservation
- 4.Environmental pollution and Disaster Management
- 5.Environment and Human Health
- 6.Environmental Treaties, Laws and Ethics

Besides this college runs many courses which address issues of gender, human values and professional ethics. Courses like Education, Sociology and BBA have many units in its syllabi on gender, human values and professional ethics.

In the one of the semester of Education there is a unit on women education which addresses issues like Education of women, problems and remedial measures, role of education in the empowerment of women.

In the subject (EDUCATION ) there are topics on human values which includes universal human values, inculcation of values in students and role of education in value enrichment.

The College adopts a transparent and vigorous mechanism related to the internal assessments. The students at the time of admission are provided with the information regarding the conduct of internal examination and the procedure to be followed. On completion of required syllabus for internal assessments, date sheet is framed by the Controller Examination of the college for internal assessment examinations. Duties are assigned to faculty members for the conduct the examination in transparent manner. The weightage of internal assessment marks is defined by the University of Jammu. The concerned Subject teacher after evaluation of the answer scripts disclose the marks to the students. If the students have any confusion, the answer scripts are shown to them and the matter is resolved to the satisfaction of the student. The students who fail to appear in the examination due to any reason are provided another opportunity to appear in the internal examination. Those students who could not secure pass marks are also provided another opportunity to sit in the examination and clear their subjects. Any examination related grievance are handled by the controller examination of the college and every possible step is undertaken to address the issue. Attempts are being taken to complete the internal examination in a time bound manner with utmost efficiency. Most of the grievances came with respect to time given for preparations. To address this issue, sufficient time period is given to students for preparing for internal examination.

**Student centric programme such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences:**

Since students are important stakeholders of the college and every student engages with learning in different ways, the learning environment must be student-centric and student friendly. Various methods like experiential learning, participatory approach and problem solving methodologies are adopted in the institution so as to make the learning more student centric. Considerable emphasis is being given on interactive classroom teaching which is also validated in the H.O.D meetings. Since the college has installed interactive panels in classrooms and labs, Powerpoint presentations, demonstration through video

clips, internet facilities are extensively used which helps the student to learn effectively. One of the important components of SCT (student centric teaching) is laboratory practical demonstrations. All the laboratories are well equipped with various instruments and interactive panels to conduct the practical sessions. Every science student performs practical experiments under the supervision of their teacher, which gives them practical knowledge about the subject. Besides practical, invited talks and field visits are also being conducted in science streams in the form of Botanical tours, Zoological tours, EVS tour etc. To make the learning more participative, classroom discussions, seminars, workshops, quiz competitions, debates, are conducted regularly. The College encourages students to acquire and develop problem-solving skills. For this, the college organizes quiz competitions, mock tests etc. which prepare them for university entrance examinations and various other competitive exams conducted by PSC/JKSSB/Banks and other recruiting agencies. Besides these, students are also encouraged to participate in various co-curricular activities within and outside the college by means of NSS and NCC which are vital components of institution. The college facilitates all possible efforts for development of students through various committees such as Career counselling and placement cell, Guidance cell, Hospitality and Protocol committee etc.

### **2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process.**

#### **Response:**

#### **Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-Learning process.**

The college has adequate IT facilities for strengthening the teaching and learning process. In our institute, the classrooms and labs are ICT enabled with LED Interactive panels installed and the campus is enabled with high speed Wifi connection. The faculties at GDC Kishtwar are combining technology with conventional mode of instruction by using various ICT enabled tools to enhance the quality of teaching-learning process. Therefore our campus is upgraded with all the necessary IT facilities. Our Classrooms and laboratories are equipped with Interactive LED Panels having online UPS facility and projectors to provide effective teaching for the students. The computer lab is equipped with 32 desktop computers with required software which are used by the students to learn basic computer skills. The computer lab is also powered by UPS to ensure uninterrupted usage of computers. Faculty members often use power point presentations, videos in their lectures to enhance learning process of the students effectively. The institute has multiple Printers, scanners, and photocopying facility available in the campus for the benefit of faculty members as well as students. The College is having well equipped Edusat Lecture Room for students to access the lectures of eminent teachers through Satellite Transmission from Edusat Hub located at Govt. College for Women Gandhi Nagar Jammu. The College has one Browsing Centres for the students with one centre having eight desktops arranged in wooden cabinets along with Online UPS, printer & LAN internet connection. Another browsing Centre is having ten desktops with WiFi connectivity is established within the library to make it more efficient and resourceful. Printing and Xerox facility is also provided to students in library. The college campus is Wi-Fi enabled and has 20-35 MBPS bandwidth of internet connection available to run the browsing centres and also the official work. Faculty members can access Wi-Fi anywhere in the campus to gain additional information, carry out research activities, and download information related to the curriculum and also to enhance their knowledge about their subject which is very important for efficient teaching-learning process. The college campus is under complete CCTV surveillance to ensure safety, transparency in the campus and also to monitor the regularity and punctuality of the faculty members as well as students in classrooms. The institute has a conference hall with LED

Interactive panel and an overhead projector which is used to organize seminars and conferences regularly on different occasions. These events promote the hidden talent among the students by providing them platform to express their views and share their ideas which not only encourage them but plays a great role in their personality development. apart from these the faculty members of the college imparts online classes and share study materials & video lectures through Wise app, Zoom, Google Meet, Google Classroom, etc and also conduct online quizzes, test series for the benefit of the students while sitting at the comfort of their homes. Online classes are of great help to the student community especially during the last two years of Covid pandemic.

After completing some part of syllabus ,internal examination notification is issued by controller examination in consultation with all HODs and Head of the institution followed by a well framed date sheet. Students are informed well in advance about the scheme of examination and pattern along with the Syllabus asked for examination. Attempts are being made to conduct the multiple number of class test in different subject by concerned faculty members before conducting the internal examination. This boost the confidence of learners to get themselves ready for internal examination .Supervisory staff is engaged in the most transparent manner in accordance with rules for the smooth conduct of examination.Head of the institution is involved personally in every step of conducting examination. For physically disabled learners,special arrangement are made in the examination centres so that they should not have any inconvenience. For internal practical examination ,Labs are being treated as examination centres and a different date sheet is being devised where students are asked to appear in examination in small groups. Practical examination run for both morning and evening sessions. Every attempt is being undertaken to make the internal examination system of the college more transparent and robust.

#### Response:

Government Degree College Kishtwar is affiliated to University of Jammu and it offers Under Graduate (UG) programs under the Faculty of Arts, Commerce and Science. The curriculum for the UG programs is designed by University of Jammu in consultation with the affiliated institutes under the banner of Board of Studies (BOS) at the university, in which head of the departments from each affiliated institute is invited to frame the module and syllabi for various programmes/courses to be undertaken at UG level. To attain the desired Course Outcome (CO) and programme outcome (PO) under Choice based credit system, our institution offers various courses like ability enhancement courses (AECC), Discipline specific Elective courses (DSEs), Generic courses, and Skill enhancement Courses (SECs). To improve the communication skill of the students our college imparts communication English, communication Urdu and communication Hindi in first and second semester of the UG programme under ability enhancement courses. Similarly, our institute offers various skill enhancement courses (SECs) to the students from 3rd semester onwards till the completion of the graduation in arts, commerce and science faculties. Apart from these, to sensitize the students about the importance of environmental education, our institute has mandated teaching environmental science as a subject in first and second semester of the UG programme in all the disciplines. To attain the desired POs and COs, the institute has mandated minimum 75% attendance in each course for the students to sit in the internal and external examinations and in faculty of science marks have been assigned for the attendance in Practical component/courses as well. The POs and COs are evaluated by the institution at different levels and in various ways like internal assessments, internal examinations, quiz competitions, seminars, home assignments, etc. The results of these evaluation methods are communicated to the students in both formal way and informal way of the discussion in the classrooms and departmental notice boards. The college has an Internal Examination committee which assists the departments of the college in successful conduct of the evaluation and also coordinates all the examination related issues between the college and Jammu University for hassle free and timely declaration of the final results by the university. At the end of each semester, university conducts external examinations and based on the result published by university the course outcomes are measured and grades are given to the students based on their performance in the examination. The attainment levels are finalized at college level and depending upon the COs students are admitted to next semester if they have attained minimum of 50 % of the total

credits in the previous semester. Finally POs are calculated by taking aggregate COs of the students in each semester and grades are given to the students based on their performance in all the six semesters.

Government degree college kishtwar was established in the year 1986, and the admission process was started in the same year. Initially the classes were started in boys higher secondary school kishtwar, there after it was shifted in DIET building and finally it was shifted to its own campus in the year 2003. College has approximately 91 kanal of land and is protected through boundary wall from all sides. During the past 20 years the number of students has increased manifold and has crossed more than 1500 in all the semesters. College started its classes in medical and non medical stream in 2001 in makeshift basis in islamia faridia college of education, and was shifted to GDC kishtwar after the completion of sciences laboratories in 2003. The institution has in total 19 lecture halls (6 smart classroom with latest gadgets) ,7 labs (4 with smart LEDs) with internet facilities, 1 sophisticated seminar hall, 1 browsing centre, IQAC, women grievance cell, Career counseling cell, EDUSAT, NCC Male and NCC female wing, all are accommodated in different rooms. Apart from this there is separate arrangement for the NSS volunteers. In order to cater the demands of IGNOU, MANUU, and distance education in connection with infrastructure are also accomplished by GDC kishtwar. Administrative block, arts block, science deptt. and labs, library, college auditorium, conference hall, play fields are monitored through CCTV. College has a rich library with all facilities including all weather ACs which inculcate the habits of reading of book among students. Librery has more than 19000 books, with a reading hall. Well established principle residential quarter had been handed over by JKPCC. One big auditorium is under construction and DPR of some planned work has been submitted to higher authorities for approval.

The College is having well equipped Edusat Lecture Room for students to access the lectures of eminent teachers through Satellite Transmission from Edusat Hub located at Govt. College for Women Gandhi Nagar Jammu. The College has two Browsing Centres. One having 08 desktops arranged in wooden cabinets along with Online UPS , 01 printer & LAN internet connection.

Another browsing Centre having 10 desktops with WiFi connectivity is established within the library to make it more efficient and resourceful. Printing and Xerox facility is also provided to students in library. The college campus is Wi-Fi enabled. Faculty members can access Wi-Fi anywhere in the campus to gain additional information, carry out research activities, and download information related to the curriculum and also to enhance their knowledge about their subject. To maintain and monitor the various facilities available in the college, the procedure adopted by the college is listed below.

**Laboratory:** In the college, there are well set laboratories in different subjects. These laboratories have necessary instruments for the academic need of the students. The students are organized in various groups to use the laboratory facilities depending on the infrastructure and instruments available in the lab. On entering the lab, the students are required to enter their names in the log book mentioning the arrival time and departure time and also the practical to be performed. Interactive panels are also provided in the laboratory to assist the teacher in demonstration of the practicals and better understanding of the students. Computer lab is monitored by camera to keep an eye on the student activity within the premises. Students of chemistry department are required to wear white apron while performing their experiments.

**Library:** The library of the college is a big hall with adequate infrastructure for reading. The students borrow books and do the study in the reading area. The library follows certain rules in the usage of books and library infrastructure. The entry register is kept for both staff and students at the entrance of the library. Anybody who enters the library must enter his/her name in the register to use the facilities in the library. At the beginning of the academic year, students are issued library cards after collecting their details. New books are issued to the students only after the previously borrowed books are returned in good condition. At the end of every semester, all the students must return the books to the library. Likewise the teachers are allowed to take books after entering in the teachers register. They also must return the books after they finish reading. Whoever leaves the institution be it a student or a faculty must get a no due certificate from

the librarian.

**Academic:** The college has adequate infrastructure for the academic purpose. The students are enrolled in the college following a defined procedure. Policies are framed and deployed right from the admission till the students leave the college. The admission policies adhere to the norms prescribed by the University of Jammu. The admission is open to all the students with a minimum qualifying percentage. The students are properly counseled before opting for any subject. Applications are scrutinized and admission process done after scrutinizing them by members of Admission Committee by strictly adhering to the university norms. The college has a *Browsing centre* for use of students and teachers regarding their internet usage and e-content. Print and copy facility is also available in the browsing centre.

**Sports activities:** All the interested students are free to participate in the sports activities in the college. The Physical Director of the college along with the sports committee shortlists some students for competitions outside the college based on their performance in the intra college competitions. One of the passout student from the college is now playing in J&K Ranji Cricket team and has also recently been called for trial tests by an IPL cricket team, Kolkata Knight Riders which is a great achievement of the college.

The working of institution is always in consonance with its vision and mission. Commissioner/Secretary is the employer on the top of hierarchy and then comes Director Colleges.

The hierarchy of the College administration works as follows:

Principal of the college is the head and Drawing and Disbursing Officer (DDO) of the institute as per the "Civil Services rule of J&K". All the teaching departments are headed by the senior faculty members of the department. The office under the control of Principal is headed by the section officer and allied staff.

At the institutional level, the Principal is the final authority on the administrative matters. As far as the financial matters are concerned, the Principal manages the utilization of all the government funds with the advice of various college committees.

To utilize the college development funds, the committee for college development, purchase committee and

Local fund committee are constituted.

All the Operations of the college are run as per its governance strategy. Committees are constituted in the beginning of the session. Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources Response: College gets grants from following agencies/resources:

The College ensures proper utilization of received/available funds with the collective efforts of Development Committee, Purchase Committee, Financial Aid Committee, Library Committee and Science Club. Departments submit their requisitions to the Principal who thereafter mark it to the concerned committee for further necessary action. Accordingly, after the completion of codal formalities the purchase of the same is completed. Heads of all the departments are members of library committee. Convener and members of this committee look after the purchase of books, journals, magazines and other related items of the same. The funds received for the development of library is divided for the purchase and maintenance of different components of the library. Funds are divided for books, periodicals and other infrastructure. Again, grant specified for books is further divided amongst different departments equitably. The funds available in college Local/Pool fund is utilized for financial assistance to the students, who are orphans, physically challenged, needy and belong to broken families. The paradigm for the same is economic as well as academic performance. For the conduct of any event, an estimated expenditure plan is made and the payments of the same are done on the production and thereafter certification of original bills in the office headed by section officer and assisted by office staff. The whole enterprise takes place under the supervision of Principal. The smoothness and transparency to all the financial matter is ensured by external audit which is from State government. Financial source has been the biggest problem while performing this practice as we are not funded by any government or non-government agency for the same. While performing economic survey or cleanliness drives many families were unsupportive. Moreover, in the beginning, to motivate teacher as well students for the practice was a challenge.

#### The Practice III

##### 1. Title of the Practice:

Health Care

##### Objectives of the Practice

The GDC Kishtwar organizes Health Care programmes for the staff and students of the college. In this regard, we invite special medical team from various departments such as ophthalmology, Gynecology, dermatology etc. to facilitate students facing different health issues. The main objective of the practice is to help our students who are facing health problems and couldn't afford private medical clinics. Since majority of the students belong to economically backward families, they are provided with free medical check-up and free medicines as well.

##### 3. The Context

The GDC Kishtwar has been taking serious steps towards the hygiene of students. It is in this regard, that it organized a free Medical Camp in collaboration with the Sub District Hospital Kishtwar under Gram Swaraj Abhiyan (Village Self-governance Campaign) on the college and staff members were facilitated with free medical check-up and medicines.

The practice is essential and prerequisite for everyone. It teaches us how to be responsible towards society. As one of the stakeholder of the society, the college always performs many practices such as the Medical care to make available medical check-up and free medicines for deserving students.

As a platform this college benefited hundreds students by this practice this year students and staff were very much thankful for the medical camp organized by the college on 28 May 2018.

#### 6 Problems Encountered an Resources Required

As always financial source has been the biggest problem while performing this practice as we are not funded by any government or non-government agency for the same. However, through some schemes such as Gram Swaraj Abhiyan (Village Self Governance Campaign) we are able to provide medical check-up to our students.
